- Traffic Signs - Used to regulate, to warn, and guide
- What shape and color is a Stop sign?
- Two-way stop sign
- Complete stop behind the stop line
- Yield - allow others to go before you
- If view is blocked after a complete stop - creep forward so you can see and stop again
- Four-way stop sign
- First come - first go
- Same time - car on the right goes first
- Same time - straight across
- Car going straight goes first
- Turning left - yield
- Turning right - both can go
- What shape and color is a Yield sign?
- Slow or stop and give right of way to cross traffic - plan to stop
- What shape and color is a Speed Limit sign?
- Minimum Speed - slowest you can drive under normal conditions
- Basic Speed Law - You may not drive faster than conditions allow
- Other Regulatory Signs
- Red \& White - what you can NOT do
- Black \& White - What you CAN do
- Diamond Symbol with red diagonal slash - action prohibited

- Vary by type of roadway
- Vary from state to state
- May be combined with info about a city's streets
- International signs use symbols instead of words
- Traffic Signals - Always yield to pedestrians
- What are the colors and order of the lights?
- Red light - top or left
- Complete stop behind the stop line
- When can you turn right at a red light?
- Complete stop
- No sign saying no turn on red
- Yield to pedestrians/traffic
- Can you ever turn left at a red light? If yes, when?
- How can you tell if a light is going to change?
- Yellow light
- Try to stop - don't gun it
- What does the term point of no return mean?
- How far away from the light would you say the point of no return is?
- How many seconds away from the light is the point of no return?
- Green light
- You have the right of way but it must be given - you can't take it
- Wait for the intersection to clear before proceeding
- Flashing signals
- Flashing red
- Complete stop
- Yield
- Proceed when intersection is clear
- Flashing yellow
- Proceed with extra caution
- Arrows
- Green - go in the direction of the arrow
- Yellow - red is about to appear
- Red - stop
- Officer's signal - always obey
- Roadway markings
- Solid Yellow - 2-way traffic - No passing
- Broken Yellow - 2-way traffic - may pass
- Solid White - 1-way traffic - no lane change
- Broken White - 1-way traffic - may change lanes
- Shared left turn - Use only to turn
- Rumble Strips - Define safe path of travel
- Red marks - Going in wrong direction
- No parking - Usually yellow or white
